From pessimist to perspective

A journey in gratitude

As part of my seminary studies at MTSO, I was asked to participate in a simple exercise: write down three good things that happened each day. While the assignment only required one week, I decided to extend it to three. What unfolded was an unexpected journey of self-discovery.

I'll be honest — I've always considered myself a pessimist. What started as perfunctory, forced entries in a gratitude journal gradually evolved into something more meaningful.

Don't get me wrong. I was still grateful when my wife made be breakfast or washed the dogs at home with minimal fuss. However, as days turned into weeks, I found myself noticing moments, people, and blessings I had previously taken for granted. A hug from Silas, watching Miles run at a cross country meet, completing chores — these small moments began to take on new significance.

A breakthrough came during an early morning run when I stopped to look at the stars. In that peaceful moment, I realized my greatest challenge was internal — my own perspective was often my biggest obstacle.

This practice led me to important questions: How does my attitude affect others? Does my self-perception influence how people view me? Can my outlook actually change outcomes?

What I've learned is that while I may still have pessimistic tendencies, I'm discovering how emotionally and spiritually rich my life truly is. Our support systems and the way we perceive our daily experiences profoundly shape our lives.

The most surprising outcome has been how this simple practice has deepened my spiritual connection. When we actively look for blessings in our daily lives, we begin to see God's presence in the smallest moments—a kind word from a stranger, the beauty of a sunrise, or the comfort of a familiar hymn. It's changed not only how

I approach my pastoral studies but how I hope to serve our community in the future.

If you're interested in trying this practice yourself, here are some takeaways from my experience:

Start small: Just three things each day, no matter how minor

Be patient: The impact isn't immediate, but builds over time

Stay consistent: Even when it feels forced, keep going

Look deeper: Simple moments often hold profound meaning

Be honest: Acknowledge both struggles and progress

Share your journey: Consider finding a partner to practice gratitude with

Connect it to prayer: Use your gratitude list as a starting point for daily devotions

Remember, as the Chinese proverb says, "The hardest part of any journey is the first step." I invite you to take that step with me.
